During another Canadian tour in 1985, Queen Elizabeth, then the Queen Mother, stated in a speech: "It is now some 46 years since I first came to this country with the King, in those anxious days shortly before the outbreak of the Second World War. I shall always look back upon that visit with feelings of affection and happiness. I think I lost my heart to Canada and Canadians, and my feelings have not changed with the passage of time."

the 180 year history of Canada, was in June 1939. Queen Elizabeth came to this country with the King (George VI), in the days shortly before the outbreak of the Second World War.

After travelling on the royal train across Canada, the monarchs spent one full day in Vancouver before heading to Victoria. Such was the welcome, it was estimated that the population of Vancouver more than doubled on that day. Their Vancouver tour was extensive, passing VGH on 12th Avenue on the way to the official welcome at the new city hall. Thousands had assembled at the city hall, including a choir of 1.500 and a band of 75 musicians. The cavalcade resumed around Vancouver with designated

stops at areas of greatest crowd concentration. The Scots in particular recognized and claimed Queen Elizabeth as their queen. Numerous pipe bands and Scottish dancers were performing en route as were many other ethnic performances. The brand new Vancouver Hotel was the stop for

lunch, for the evening gala, and finally for sleep. In the morning they were off to Victoria for a large celebration in the province's capital. Classmate Anne Mitton (Lennox'54) remembers the cavalcade passing and stopping in front of her family. The King opened the car door and leaned out for a few moments before shutting it and moving on (was he sick or? her family speculated). As a seven-


immediately affected by the cancellation of the luncheons, and we wanted to see how this would work and if there was interest in the plan.




New in 2022: Some RNFBC Bursaries are open to students in LPN and RPN programmes and to nurses enrolled in some specialty/certificate programmes offered through BCCNM and CNA.

The Vancouver General Hospital School of Nursing Alumnae Bursary was created in 1984 from donations from the Alumnae Association, former graduates, and from the proceeds of the sale of the VGH Manor. The funding is available for students enrolled in baccalaureate nursing programmes, graduates of a basic programme, the UBC/VGH Collaborative programme, and for descendants of graduates of these programmes. When all suitable candidates have received awards and there is still funding available, candidates holding the basic criteria can be considered by the RNFBC Bursary Committee if they are permanent residents of British Columbia and have graduated from a BC School of Nursing.

In 2022, the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Bursaries were given to 25 students and graduates. The 25 thank you notes from the winners indicated sincere appreciation for the award and often tell of why nursing was chosen as a career.



It is with much gratitude that I write to you as the recipient of The Inez (Fox-Sept'55) Mowat Memorial Bursary.

I graduated from the UBC/VGH School of Nursing in 1993 and worked most of my career as a Public Health Nurse. I have always been passionate about breastfeeding and in 1998 I earned a certification with the International Board of Lactation Consultant Examiners. Last year, I accepted a two-year temporary new role at BC Children's Hospital as a Lactation Consultant.

I have developed a partnership with the Cardiac Care Clinic and the Palate and Craniofacial team and started connecting with families prenatally to provide education and anticipatory guidance in meeting their feeding goals when it is identified that a baby will be born with a Congenital Heart defect or a Craniofacial defect.

During the last year, I have been working hard to create a culture that values human milk feeding and sees the parent and baby as a dyad (rather than just focusing on the baby). My goal is to empower parents and provide family-centered care. I tell almost all the mothers that I provide care to that their milk is "medicine for your baby" as it is full of immunity protecting the child. I also often say

to parents that their body is an "intervention that stabilizes your baby" as we know that skin-to-skin contact and cuddling deregulates the stress response. I have provided education sessions to students, nurses, doctors and care aids. I have also tried to influence policy to better support a developmental care model, one that embraces the parent as the center of care and helps to create a healing environment for hospitalized infants and their families.

As with any opportunity that is rewarding, there are often challenges to overcome. Working with hospitalized infants and children is and will continue to be a humbling journey. There was a steep learning curve as I had never worked as a pediatric nurse. I am also often navigating the emotional aspects of helping families during such a sensitive and vulnerable time in their life.

Virginia Rutherford (Doyle '46)

Virginia's nephew, in a note two years ago thanking the Association for an orchid that arrived for his aunt and again last year her niece, **Rita Rawstron** (**Rutherford '57**) told us that Virginia wanted to tell us that the orchid was blooming again.

Virginia is 102 "alive and kicking, and as good as she was 30 years ago. She has many memories of her days as a student."

Her first experience as a student was in the big open men's ward. She found it very challenging and was beginning to think nursing wasn't for her. "Someone was going to heave up so I brought two basins." **Dorothy Rutherford (Thomson '57)** who became her sister in law and was in the same class said "what did you bring two for Doyle? Is one for yourself?" The Supervisor would come and line up all the wheels on the beds in the big ward so they were facing the same way.

"Miss Palliser was the Director of Nursing. It was her first year and everyone loved her. Apparently the one before was Miss Fairley and she was tough and strict. Anne Cavers was the excellent anatomy instructor, but she was strict. She had a couple of quotes, "once a nurse, always a nurse," and "the door swings both ways." The war was on, and we got paid \$25 as a staff student during the last nine months because of the war effort. We had to pay for breakage. We boiled


the nipples for the babies in an aluminum pot. Someone got in big trouble as the pot boiled dry. Aluminum was so scarce because of the war and pots were scarce."

Upon graduation, Virginia won The Glen Campbell Award for nursing excellence in the diseases of the eye (exam score 97%). Dorothy won an award in operating room excellence. Barbara Schoons was valedictorian. Other awards went to Pauline Woodward, and Mickey Schnell (Price). One hundred and seven nurses received diplomas and prizes.

After graduation Virginia took a year off to tour Canada with her mum, then she worked in the Private Pavilion, general medicine. She was engaged in 1948 and married the following year.

The VGH Alumnae Association is very important. Times have changed but nursing is still a noble profession.

Correspondence

Three 1952-53 photos were sent by Anne Mitten (Lennox UBC '55) reminding us that before the Children's Hospital on 12th Avenue was completely finished, part of the basement of the residence was used as a temporary children's ward. The students were allowed to take the patients out to the back of the residence for a bit of fresh air. One student, (unnamed), remembers well, shortly after arriving for 11:00 p.m. duty became violently ill with the D's and V's. There was nothing to do but to leave the ward



shorthanded.
Reporting to the matron, and hoping for a quick run to the facilities and then to bed, their word was to take the tunnel to the Private Pavilion, on Oak street, and be admitted there. That long dark trek, at night, was not for the faint of heart.

By nature, Canadians are somewhat undemonstrative; on this supreme occasion their loyalty to their sovereigns has echoed round a listening and fear-ridden world.

In 1951 Princess Elizabeth, Duchess of Edinburgh, along with her husband, Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh, made their first royal tour of Canada. They visited every province including Newfoundland, the newest, on behalf of her ailing father. They arriving in Vancouver by royal train on Saturday Oct. 20. At the station and along the parade route and at every stop they were greeted by hoards of admirers.

The crowd were enchanted by a "beautiful young princess and her handsome prince." They spent a busy day and evening ending with a gala at the Hotel Vancouver. On Sunday morning they attended a church service at St. Andrew's Wesley before boarding the ship to Victoria.

Oct 20th was a cold, overcast day with forecast of rain. The whole Sept '54 probie class, who were in class learning how to take temperatures that

Saturday, were lined up for "hours" (with capes open), before the

were huge successes for the royal establishment and for the predominantly British population the time. Individual visits from royal family members have generally been. of a working nature. Later royal family visits have been very successful but have not had a VGH presence.
