THE TIME HAS COME

The members attending the annual meeting of the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association held on March 4, 2025 via zoom voted in favour of the following motion:

That the Vancouver General Hospital School of Nursing Alumnae Association be dissolved by the year 2028.

History

1. The Alumnae Association was started in 1908 and has been in continuous operation since then using a variety of operational models.
2. The VGH School of Nursing commenced operation in 1899 with eight students and was based in the hospital until 1991. The graduates received a Diploma in Nursing.
3. In 1989, a collaborative nursing program was established with the UBC School of Nursing. Students graduated with a BSN degree from UBC. The last class graduated from the UBC/VGH collaborative program in May 1998.
4. In 99 years, VGH graduated 8,768 students.

Operations

1. The VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association operates with the constitution and bylaws which are prepared and approved under the *Societies Act* of British Columbia.
2. The Purposes of the Association are:
 - to promote unity, loyalty, and good fellowship among the graduates of the VGH School of Nursing and the UBC/VGH Collaborative Program
 - to advance the interest and uphold the standards of the profession of Nursing-to provide assistance to Association members with special needs and with limited or no income
 - to preserve the historical records and artifacts of the VGH School of Nursing, the VGH School of Nursing Association, and the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Building Society Association, and the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Building Society
3. The bylaws are statements regarding definitions in the document, membership, general and special meetings, roles of the Directors, signing authority, a non-profit clause, and the dissolution of the association. The bylaws are reviewed on a regular basis and revised as required.

Current Situation

1. The Board of Directors has been requesting assistance from the membership since 2017 in order to carry out the work of the Committees and the role of the Board of Directors.
2. As there has not been a positive response for more volunteers to help, the Directors took on the positions of Chairs of the Committees.
 - the Executive Secretary position was expanded to include management of the finances.
 - the annual luncheon was stopped following the COVID pandemic.
 - the three accounts of General, Archive, and Education were merged into one account, and the investments were adjusted to mature on a basis to meet the needs of the association.
 - recognition of the classes celebrating their 50th and 60th anniversaries was addressed by providing grants

to the four classes each year to assist with class reunions. the website was renewed and a major archival project has been added to the archival and artifact holdings on the website.

3. The Annual General Meetings have been held via Zoom since 2020 in order to have association members join the meeting. The response has been disappointing as only two members asked to attend on two different times. three non-Board members joined in 2025.

Procedure for Dissolution

1. Considerable time is required to determine the steps in the dissolution process in order to deal with the property and financial assets.
2. Article 8 Dissolution of the Association in the bylaws states:
 - 8.1 The dissolution of the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association will be determined by a vote on a Special Resolution by members attending a Special Meeting
 - 8.2 In the event the organization dissolves, after it pays all of the debts and liabilities, it will distribute or dispose of its remaining property to qualified donees as described in subsection 149.1 (1) of the Income Tax Act.
3. Article 3.3 Notice of Special Business states: A notice of a general meeting must state the nature of the business, other than ordinary business, to be transacted at the meeting in sufficient detail to permit a member receiving the notice to form a reasonable judgement concerning that business.
4. Article 3.7 Quorum for General Meetings states: The quorum for the transaction of business at a general meeting is 3 voting members or 10% of the voting members, whichever is greater. (If the membership is 700 members, the number required is 70 members).
5. Article 3.13 Method of Voting states: At a general meeting, voting must be by a show of hands, an oral vote or another method that adequately discloses the intention of the voting members, except that if, before or after a vote, 2 or more members request a secret ballot or a secret ballot as directed by the chair of the meeting, voting must be by a secret ballot.
6. Article 3.15 Proxy Voting states: Proxy voting is not permitted.

Proposed Action

1. The motion to dissolve the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association was proposed at the AGM.
2. If the motion is approved, the details surrounding the decision will be placed on the front page of the 2025 Newsletter.
3. At the Fall Luncheon on September 18, 2025, a Special Meeting will be convened in order to vote on the motion to dissolve. This information will be included in the invitation sent to the members who indicated on their Membership Renewal document that they planned to attend the luncheon.
4. There will be opportunity to discuss the proposal at the Luncheon.
5. Following the Special Resolution vote, the steps to resolve the situation will be discussed at the Board of Directors meeting on September 25, 2025.

Membership Report 2024



The total paid membership for 2024 is 612 (down from 629 last year) In addition to the paid members there are 40 Special Alums, 5 Honourary Members and 18 Life Members for a total of 675 active members.

Of those 61 paid members 319 made a donation on top of the \$20 membership fee.

The application form, which was included in the renewal package, makes it easy to donate to your choice of the General, Archives or Education fund. A tax receipt will be issued for the total amount.

The majority of our members are from the 1950's (104) and 1960's (262) There are 127 from the 1970s, 103 from the 1980s and 16 from the 1990s. Nearly all of the Board members are from the 1960's classes.

In 2019 we began the practice of mailing personalized letters to all members of the 50 and 60 year classes inviting them to join or renew their membership. Originally this was to invite them to the Annual Luncheon. As this luncheon no longer takes place, we

are inviting class

reps to apply for funding towards a reunion activity.

For those of you who are current members and receive the Newsletter, please encourage others from your class to join or renew their membership.

The benefits of membership are numerous. The many hard working volunteers keep our organization vibrant. Historical items are acquired and maintained by the Archives committee. The Annual Newsletter contains information about events that have taken place and special achievements of our Alums. Flowers and cards are sent to shut-ins or those recovering from illness or surgery and sympathy cards are sent to families of deceased graduates. Descendants of graduates who are members can apply for educational bursaries of up to \$1,000 per year for pursuing education in the field of nursing. A database of the over 8,000 graduates from our School of Nursing is maintained. If you know of any changes of address or of any deaths of your classmates please forward that information to the Alumnae office.

Education Committee Report

The Education Committee is pleased with the continued interest in our bursary program. A descendant of a grad of the VGH/SON Diploma program or UBC/VGH Collaborative Degree program is eligible to apply for a bursary. This includes daughters, sons, grandchildren, nieces, or nephews. Required proof is a photocopy of the graduate's diploma and/or a letter of explanation including the relationship to the graduate. With thanks to the overwhelming generosity of Alumnae members, our funds continue to increase, and we can offer larger bursaries depending on the category.

We have received letters of thanks and appreciation from the students for the generous support of the Alumnae Association. It is encouraging to watch these young people entering the nursing profession with passion and enthusiasm as they look forward to an exciting career. We wish them all the best as they work hard to complete their schooling.

We are also pleased to offer funds to VGH/SON Diploma grads and UBC/VGH Collaborative Degree Program grads to assist with continuing education, recertification, conferences, and workshops.

In 2024 we had sixteen applications for bursary awards. All applicants this year were descendants of VGH grads. We were pleased to award a total of \$31,200 to the bursary applicants.

Articles from the archives are used in the window displays. These are changed five times a year under the direction of Arlene Vanderhoeven.

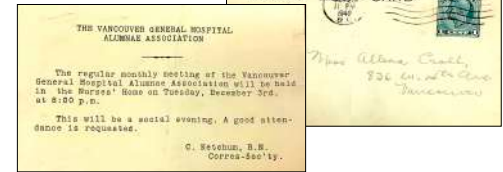

Friendship Committee Report 2024

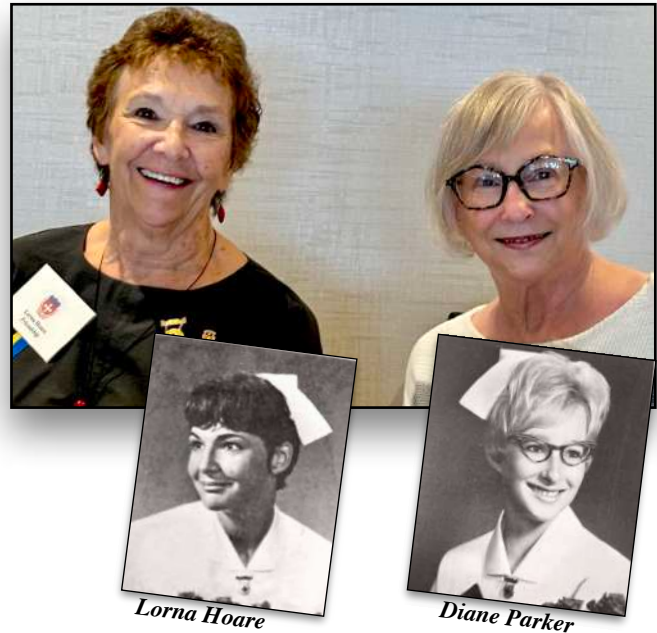

Core Trethewey Endowment Fund Guidelines Revised

Cora Trethewey, a 1922 graduate of the VGH School of Nursing, left a significant endowment to the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association to provide short term financial assistance for VGH graduates who have limited income or who are in financial need. Guidelines were prepared and have been reviewed and revised as required over the years. Since there have been no graduates from the school of nursing or the UBC/VGH Collaborative program since 1998, the purpose of the fund was revised by the Board of Directors in January 2025 as follows:

“The Endowment was established to provide financial assistance to members with special needs and/or limited income, for extraordinary expenses. If there are no requests from a graduate for assistance, requests from descendants of graduates will be considered.

If there are no applications for the fund during the year, the interest is assigned to the Annual Luncheon expenses when needed.”

VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Building Society/ Association Fund

This Endowment was established in 2002 to promote life-long learning for nurses at the Vancouver General Hospital, UBC Hospital, GF Strong Rehabilitation Centre and Vancouver Community Health Services.

In 2024, 36 Bursaries were awarded. In addition, a Research grant of \$5,000 was provided to help fund the creation of a Podcast for healthcare staff to deepen their learning of Indigenous Cultural Safety and Indigenous Specific Anti-Racism.

Nursing Reunions, A Family Affair

As a recipient of the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association Bursary during the completion of my Master of Nursing, I have had the opportunity to reflect on how being part of a nursing family has influenced my career and growth as a nurse. My mother, Corrine Hill, and my two aunts, Judy and Linda Hill, are all VGH SON alumnae. A family of nurses is a unique privilege and their experiences have made for some entertaining dinner conversations over the years!

Judy (class of September 1965) settled in Forks, Washington with her husband. Their short-term plans for this small town turned into 40 years in this close-knit community. Over the years, Judy worked at the local hospital, drove many miles providing home health around the Peninsula, and cared for students as the school nurse for over twenty years.

Linda (class of September 1979) began her career at VGH in pediatric cardiology before setting with her family in Surrey, where she continued her work in pediatrics and general surgery. While raising her four children, she taught prenatal classes in her community. Moving away from nursing, she followed a passion for travel as a travel agent, exploring many areas of the world.

Corrine (class of September 1982) moved to Brooks, Alberta upon graduation where she worked in their ER/ICU for several years before returning to BC. She graduated with her baccalaureate degree from U Vic in 1993 and her Masters from UBC in 1998. She was drawn to public health where she moved into leadership positions. She finished her career as a nursing educator with BCIT, where she still teaches through distance education.

Growing up, our family heard countless stories of their experiences as VGH nursing graduates. So much so, I knew there was no other calling for myself other than nursing. And so began the next generation of nurses.

Linda's daughter, Christine, has been a nurse since 2008. After working in a variety of nursing areas, a family tie to kidney disease led to her specializing in renal care. She now provides hemodialysis and collaborative care to those living with chronic kidney disease. To Christine, nursing has always been a calling—to be a source of advocacy, strength, and comfort for those going through a hard season in their life.

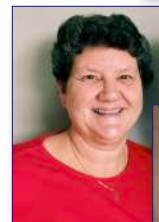
I may have followed my mom, Corrine's, footsteps into nursing, but my passions in nursing are a cumulation of all my mom and my aunts' stories and the impact they have had on their communities. 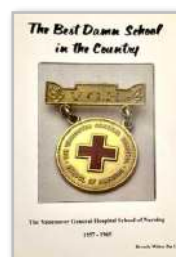

The Registered Nurses Foundation of BC

The RNFBC is proud to announce a significant milestone in its commitment to advancing nursing education and supporting healthcare excellence in British Columbia. Thanks to a generous \$5 million grant from the Ministry of Health, awarded over five years, RNFBC has been able to expand the bursary program dramatically. This year (2024) alone, bursaries totalling \$901,000 were awarded to 866 nursing students and nurses marking an increase of over 700 bursaries compared to previous years.

The RNFBC was established in 1979 as a non-profit organization with federal charitable status.

Its mandate is to support all nurses and nursing students in BC pursuing basic and advanced education by raising funds to allow for the distribution of bursaries to qualified applicants.

The RNFBC celebrated 45 years of supporting nursing at a luncheon on March 5, 2025.

The VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association Endowment was created in 1984. There have been additional donations from the Alumnae Association, former graduates, and from the proceeds of the sale of the VGH Manor. This Endowment is available for:

- students enrolled in undergraduate or graduate programs
- graduates of the VGH School of Nursing or the UBC/VGH collaborative program
- descendants of graduate of the VGH SON or the UBC/VGH collaborative program
- permanent BC residents who graduated from a BC School of Nursing, if there is no suitable candidate found meeting the foregoing criteria

Disbursements of the of the funds is restricted to investment income only.

I would like to start off this letter by introducing myself. My name is Mary, and I am a first-year nursing student at CNC and will be graduating from UNBC. I was born in Pemberton, and moved to Enderby, in 2010 when I was seven years old. I have remained in the Okanagan ever since.

Growing up with my older sister, she always knew she wanted to be a nurse. I was less sure about my path after graduating high school and this always worried me. I completed my Dental Assisting Certificate a year out of school in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, and I worked as a CDA for the next 2.5 years. After roughly 1.5 years I decided I wanted to expand my career and my options, so I started upgrading courses to apply to nursing school.

After working and doing courses at my local college in Salmon Arm, I applied to many schools nearby, along with CNC in Quesnel. To my disappointment, I was denied from the schools I applied to, but I was accepted to CNC. An ambitious plan at VGH

An ambitious plan is underway for the expansion of Vancouver General Hospital.

The city is seeking public opinion on the hospital's rezoning application, which would redevelop the block at 900 and 990 West 12th Ave. to become the site of two new hospital towers housing a long-term care home, a daycare, a public plaza, and more.

The project would provide expanded clinical and office space, while consolidating Coastal Health Authority programs that occupy leased spaces spread elsewhere along the Broadway corridor.

It would keep pace with the province's aging and growing

population and the first phase of the project is estimated to cost around \$400 million, though that figure "may change as we continue to refine the designed and details," said the VGH and UBC Hospital Foundation's senior vice-president, Liza Jerome.

The foundation, which is immediately south of the current VGH campus, bought the lot when it came up for sale in 2022.

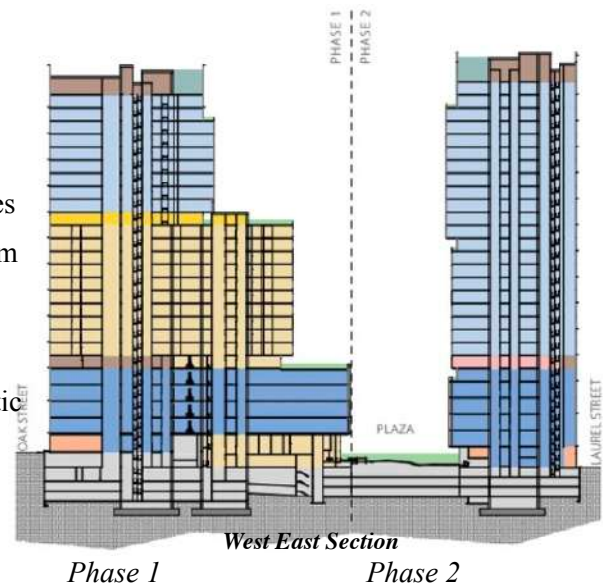
It is home to the 14-storey Windermere Care Centre, a 207-bed care facility, and a three-storey rental apartment building with 26 residential units.

"A tenant relocation plan is currently underway, as the new development will not include any residential units on site," the application reads. The lots are zoned for comprehensive development and residential. The hospital foundation is applying to rezone the lot.

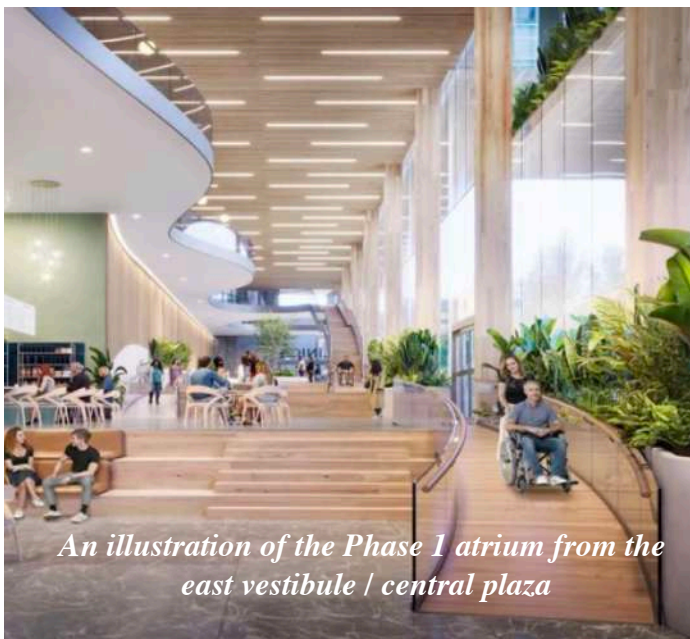

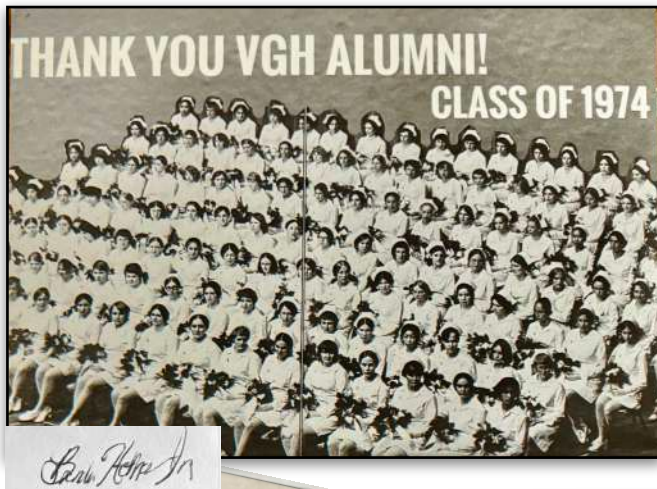

The dreaded mustard plaster was applied to my tender, congested chest when I had pneumonia. On winter days we faithfully took our Cod Liver Oil capsules.

Grandma’s medicine cabinet held Dodd’s Kidney Pills, Carter’s Little Liver pills, witch hazel, and vinegar.

I am informing you of the death of my mother Connie Pike. She passed away on April 25, 2024, in her 94th year. I have included some interesting photocopies if you would like to make use of them.

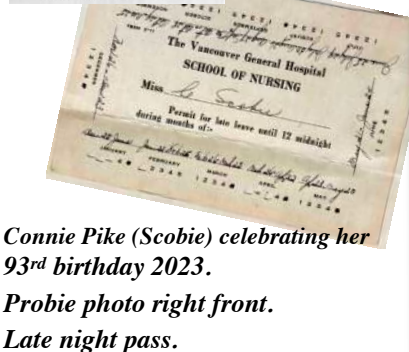
She did marry one of the engineers from the UBC/ VGHS mixer. They had three children and were married for 73 years.

Jane revisited her interest in Public Health and cancer research and was appointed to the Board of Governors of Trustees for the Cancer Agency becoming President of the BCCA in 1990. Jane was instrumental in expanding treatment centres in the province so that all British Columbians could have easier access to cancer treatment. She was awarded the Order of Canada for her many years of volunteer service, both for her work at the aquarium and with BCCA.

In 1984 Jane married Senator George Van Roggen. They enjoyed traveling and sailing BC's coastline in George's boat the *Free Trade*.

She was appointed as a Citizenship Court Judge, her first paying job since she was hired as a general duty nurse at VGH. Jane was proud to welcome and share her love of Canada with newcomers. She was awarded Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2012 in recognition for her significant contributions to British Columbia.

Following retirement Kay expanded her volunteering to include a variety of roles at Van Dusen Gardens as a guide and a volunteer in the membership department. She was also active in the VGH School of Nursing Alumnae Association. For many years she organized the Annual Luncheon, helped organizing class reunions and was on the Executive Committee. She was selected as a Life Member.

In later years she moved to Kamloops to a retirement home where she enjoyed the activities and comradery of the other guests.

Kay was an exceptional nurse and a pillar of the profession.

She was also a great supporter and champion of the BC Operating Room Nurses Group and Van Dusen as well as her own School of Nursing friends.
